Thank You Volunteers! Activities happen when people get involved

It is with our heartfelt thanks that the Township of Killaloe, Hagarty and Richards recognizes the many volunteers in the community during National Volunteer Week, held from April 12-18, 2015. Volunteering is at the heart of our community development because of the influence on our community. Volunteers contribute to local boards, plan events, run summer and winter activities and much more.

50% of Canadians Volunteer If you would like to be a volunteer in the community, you would join about 50% of Canadians who annually contribute their time, energy and skills to groups and organizations. A survey by Statistics Canada shows that the amount of volunteer time contributed across Canada was the same as just under 1.1 million jobs! And, volunteer



commitment is on the rise, increasing almost 7% from 2007 to 2010. Many Canadians become involved in volunteering because people they know are doing it. In 2010, 43% of volunteers said they did their volunteer work as part of a group project with friends, neighbours or co-workers; another 25% said they had joined members of their immediate family in their volunteer work. The most

popular areas in which people volunteer are sports and recreation, and social services.

The ages at which volunteers contribute is also interesting. While young people aged 15-24 volunteer more often (58%) compared to those aged 55-64 (46%), it is the older cohort that puts in the most hours. Youth average 130 volunteer hours on average while those over age 55 average 223 hours.

The value in volunteering is that everyone can do it.

In Killaloe, Hagarty and Richards, there are many ways for people of all ages to volunteer, and for a time commitment that works with each person's schedule. Residential Fences

Questions and answers on a common issue

Q: My neighbour is building a fence between our properties. Do I have to pay for half?

A: No. You are not obligated to share the costs. However, cooperation between neighbours often results in cost shared projects. Disputes arising out of fence construction or location can only be resolved through civil litigation.

Q: Should the fence look a certain way?

A: Except for fences to private pools, the township does not regulate or restrict construction style, however the fences are required to be reasonably uniform in colour and pattern.

Q: What materials can be used to build a fence?

A: Fences are to be constructed of materials specifically



designed or commonly used for fencing purposes and may include wood, brick, concrete, and metal.

Q: Do I require a permit to build a fence?

A: No. A building permit is not required to build a standard residential fence.

Q: Where can I build my fence?

A: A fence can be erected along and up to a property line but within the property limits. However, when a fence is shared by adjoining neighbours it may be built right on the property line with permission of both neighbours.

Q: How do I determine my property lines?

A: To accurately locate property lines, a survey is recommended.

Q: How can I obtain a survey?

A: Check your records. Some homeowners may have previously acquired this document during the purchase of a property. Otherwise, the services of a qualified Land Surveyor should be obtained. A number of services are located in the Yellow Pages. Using the services of a Land Surveyor is the best way to avoid property boundary disputes with neighbours.


Thanks to some great volunteers, council has agreed to create a baseball diamond at Round Lake Recreation Park, Bring on the summer fun!

Carbon Monoxide

Helpful update from your local fire department

Carbon Monoxide is a poisonous gas that you cannot see, taste or smell. It can kill without warning and in a matter of minutes. The release of Carbon Monoxide can occur when fuel-burning appliances have not been properly maintained, or when a chimney flue or air vent has been blocked. If vour residence has a fuelburning appliance (propane furnace, oil-burning furnace, gas stove, wood-burning furnace, gas water heater, fireplace) or an attached garage, you must have a Carbon Monoxide alarm installed adjacent to each sleeping area in your residence. This is effective as of April 15, 2015.

You can purchase Carbon Monoxide detectors at most hardware stores and box stores



as well as from local safety and fire safety suppliers.

Poisoning Symptoms

The initial symptoms of Carbon Monoxide poisoning may include a dull headache, weakness, chest pain, dizziness, exhaustion, drowsiness, lightheadedness, heart palpitations and nausea. High-level poisoning can result in vomiting, shortness of breath, blurred vision, confusion and loss of consciousness.

If you experience these symptoms and suspect Carbon Monoxide poisoning, get outside for fresh air and call 911.

Smoke Alarms

As a reminder, smoke alarms have a 10 year life expectancy. You should check your smoke alarms monthly to ensure they are working properly. Residents

are reminded to keep their smoke alarms clean and not to paint them.
